As parents, you can make the biggest difference to your child's success as a reader by encouraging your child to read as much and as widely as possible at home. Your child will have a reading bag/book bag to keep the take-home reading book in (and other homework). A short daily reading session at home can make all the difference to your child's progress.


The IOE study, which is believed to be the first to examine the effect of reading for pleasure on cognitive development over time, found that children who read for pleasure made more progress in maths, vocabulary and spelling than those who rarely read.

Researchers found that children who receive bedtime stories from their parents as infants perform better than those who go without.

It develops children's ability to express themselves more confidently, easily, and clearly in spoken AND written terms.


It moulds our kids into becoming readers, and raising a reader significantly increases our child's potential for academic success as well as lifelong success in general.


It builds listening skills, increases a child's attention span, and develops the ability to concentrate at length of which all are learned skills.


Reading


Did you know how valuable it is for your child to read every day...



Reading books.

The first books use pictures without words to tell the story. Important skill of use the picture cues to tell the story.

Level 1 books use captions. Here we will be using concepts about print, sentence structure, picture cues, high frequency words to read simple texts.

Phase 2 books introduce children to use the sounds they know to blend to read.

Books sent home are 'seen' Guided reading books.

How can you help at home?

Build up reading stamina.

Use lots of praise.

Practise key words.

Ask questions to ensure understanding.

Use reading prompts to encourage independence.

Questions to ask your child to help them develop their reading skills:

To hear sounds and words:

- What is the first letter?
- Where do we start?
- What's the first letter in `look'?

To find first letters:

- You said....was that right?
- What sound does it make? What's its name?
- Does that sound right?

To attend to the meaning:

- You said....Does that make sense?
- What word could that be?
- How did you know that words said....does that fit there?
- Does it sound right?

Reading record books.

At Springfield we monitor how much our pupils read each week.

Children are rewarded for their reading at home.

The class with the highest number of children who have met our school reading challenge recieves a trophy.

Children are encouraged to read 5+ times or more each week.

Bug Club is a finely-levelled reading scheme, which ensures that all children can find books at exactly the right level for them. What's more, there are online versions for every printed title and a personalised website for each child.

Using the printed books

Inside every printed book there are notes to help you make the most of reading with your child.



Inside Front Cover: for younger children, these notes identify difficult words with which children may need help and give ideas and strategies to help you feel confident that you know how best to help. For older children, the notes are intended to deepen each child's understanding of the book. They provide background information about the time or place the book was written or sometimes information about the author or illustrator.
