continent - a very large area of land made up of lots of countries including islands.



equator - an imaginary line which runs around the centre of the globe at an equal distance between the North and South Poles.




human features - features of our world that have been made by humans.



landmark - a feature of a landscape or place that is easily recognised, either a human feature or a physical feature.



The World's Seven Continents and Five Oceans



The United Kingdom is in Europe. Europe is the second smallest **continent**. It lies north of the **equator**, in the **northern hemisphere**.

Asia is the largest **continent**. Most of Asia is north of the **equator**, in the **northern hemisphere**.

Oceania (Australia/Australasia) is the smallest continent. It is almost entirely south of the **equator**, in the **southern hemisphere**.

The Pacific Ocean is the largest **ocean**. The Arctic Ocean is the smallest **ocean**.







landscape - the appearance of a large area of land.



north pole - the point on the surface of the Earth that is furthest north.



northern hemisphere - one half of the Earth, north of the equator.



ocean - a large area of salt water.



physical features - features of our world that are natural.



population - the total number of people who live in an area.




South Pole - the point on the surface of the Earth that is furthest south.



southern hemisphere - one half of the Earth, south of the equator.





Compass Points

The four main compass points are: north, east, south and west.

Halfway between these points are: north east, south east, south west and north west.
